We launched an innovative \$2 million program in Kenya supported by Astellas Pharma EMEA, which selected Fistula Foundation through a rigorous and competitive process. This support is helping us build the world's first fistula treatment network, enabling us to tackle fistula from every angle: expanding the pool of trained fistula surgeons, engaging communities, and strengthening the network of hospitals in Kenya that provide high quality fistula surgery. One year in, we already see the potential to replicate this strategy for comprehensive fistula treatment in other countries and regions.

In addition, we've deepened our commitment to train more fistula surgeons than ever before in association with the International Federation of Gynecology and Obstetrics (FIGO).
