Kathmandu Model Hospital Reconstruction a Success!

In the days following the devastating April earthquake in Nepal, you helped us raise an incredible \$150,000 in 24 hours to repair extensive damage to an operating room at our partner site, Kathmandu Model Hospital. We are happy to report that thanks to so many of you, and to the support of Frank Richardson – who provided a generous 2:1 matching gift for this effort, reconstruction is nearly complete and the hospital is now fully functional! It was a long process that required substantial repairs to damaged infrastructure, gas pipelines, and elevators, just to name a few. and his team at Kathmandu Model Hospital can once again provide lifetransforming fistula surgeries for women in Nepal, not to mention countless other critical medical services. Thanks again to everyone who supported this effort!

Surgeon Spotlight

Action on Fistula Surgeon Trainee Dr. Joseph Liko

Dr. Joseph Liko is an OB/GYN at Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital in Kenya. Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital is the second largest referral hospital in the country and serves a population of nearly 16 million people, mainly from three provinces in western Kenya as well as some parts of eastern Uganda and northern Tanzania. Obstetric fistula is prevalent in this region, and Dr. Liko sees a number of women come to the hospital each month whose lives have been devastated by its physical and social effects – not only are they incontinent, but they are often also suffering from malnutrition, stunted growth and depression. Yet there are never enough trained surgeons to effectively address the problem.

Dr. Liko decided he wanted to do something to help, especially after learning that many of the patients were from the same village where he grew up. "Charity begins at home," he thought, and he applied for a fellowship with the International Federation of Gynecology and Obstetrics (FIGO)'s fistula surgery training program. His skills and dedication landed him a spot as a surgeon trainee at a FIGO-certified center in Kenya. He began training under Dr. Hillary Mabeya at Gynocare Fistula Center in June of this year, as a trainee in our Action on Fistula surgeon training program, funded by Astellas Pharma EMEA.

Dr. Liko completed his training in July and is now certified by FIGO as a standard level fistula surgeon. He will continue working with Dr. Mabeya at Gynocare, and hopes to one day become a trainer himself so that he can help other young surgeons address this important medical issue facing the women of Kenya.

You Did It!

Fistula Foundation Supporters Raise \$500,000 to Build a New Fistula Hospital in Kenya

September was a big month for us at Fistula Foundation – we launched our first-ever campaign to fund the construction of a brand new fistula hospital in Kenya. It was an ambitious undertaking, but thanks to you, we were able to reach our goal of \$250,000 by September 30, enabling us to secure the full matching gift from our generous, anonymous donor!

The man behind this hospital is Dr. Hillary Mabeya, a visionary Kenyan surgeon whose life's mission has been to provide healing to women with fistula. Since 2009, he has worked from a makeshift health center that he rented and converted out of a formerly dilapidated house. Armed with a little elbow grease, a lot of determination and support from partners like One by One, Dr. Mabeya was able to turn that makeshift clinic into what is today Kenya's most impactful permanent fistula treatment center. But space grew too tight, and the landlord tripled Dr. Mabeya's rent, causing financial strain. Your help has enabled Dr. Mabeya to build the hospital he has dreamed of.

All of the funds raised through our campaign will go to construction costs of his new fistula hospital. When complete, the three-story building will immediately double the number of patient beds available, with room to grow. More operating space will be available, so more surgeons can get training in fistula repair through both FIGO and our Action on Fistula surgeon training program, and more women can be treated. And the new hospital will finally have indoor space for a dedicated counseling center that can help women heal emotionally and spiritually, as well as physically.

ONE WOMAN'S STORY

Binta from Guinea



Binta was treated at Jean Paul II Hospital in Conakry in Guinea



Binta is 35 years old and from Fidi, a landlocked village in northwestern Guinea. At 14 years old she was forced to marry a much older man, and soon became pregnant. After five days of painful labor, she lost her baby. A few days later, she realized that she was not able to control her urine. Binta spoke with her aunt who alerted her other family members, and together they decided to request the services of a traditional healer. The family sold their two goats to pay the traditional healer, whose services did nothing to heal Binta's fistula.

Little by little Binta became isolated from her friends. She felt ashamed, and eventually went to the neighboring country, Guinea-Bissau, to seek treatment. She spent nine months there working as a housekeeper, sometimes even begging to survive, but still did not have enough money for treatment, so finally returned home to Guinea.

One day, Binta's uncle heard a rural radio message inviting women like her to the local hospital for treatment. Binta went straight from her village to the hospital and, following an examination by a doctor, she and three other women were transported to Jean Paul II Hospital in the capital city, Conakry. Binta was required to stay for observation for 21 days before the surgery to ensure she was not affected by the Ebola virus, after which she finally received the surgery she had been waiting for 20 long years...and it was a success! Overjoyed, Binta exclaimed, "Unbelievably, I am dry! No more leakage, no more bad smell! It's just a miracle!"

Your Donations at Work

Zimbabwe | Following a pilot project in 2013, we were able to establish routine fistula care services in Zimbabwe in conjunction with our long-term partner, Women and Health Alliance International (WAHA). Over the last year, 84 women received free, life-transforming



repair surgeries at Parirenyatwa Hospital and Harare Central Hospital thanks to your support. These women also received psychological counseling, nutritional support and physical therapy, helping them to rebuild their health and confidence before they returned to their communities.

We are proud to partner with the International Federation of Gynecology and Obstetrics (FIGO) on a training program for new fistula surgeons. This September, FIGO hosted a meeting largely for initial Fellows in the training program to discuss ongoing needs and challenges. Fistula Foundation Board Chair, Dr. Sohier Elneil, and Medical Director, Dr. Steven Arrowsmith, attended the meeting which was held in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. They were both greatly encouraged to find that all of the Fellows have remained active in fistula care and are helping women in a wide variety of geographic locations: Nepal, Nigeria, Bangladesh, and Uganda, just to name a few.

Fellows expressed a desire to continue to continue their training in more advanced fistula repair, and also expressed the need for better equipped operating rooms at their respective facilities. Fistula Foundation is committed to supporting fistula surgeons and facilitating advanced training opportunities, and will continue working with FIGO to improve the program based on feedback from this meeting.

Your Donations at Work

Angola | In 2013, Fistula Foundation began working with a new partner in Damba, Angola, known as Unidade Fístula Obstétrica (UFO). UFO is the only fistula treatment center in northern Angola, a country known for its poor health care infrastructure and the highest rate of child mortality in the world. In the first half of this project alone, 154 women received free fistula repair surgeries as



well as free transportation, nutritious meals and accommodation as they recovered. In addition, two local surgeons and several nurses received training in fistula repair and care.
